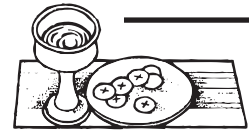

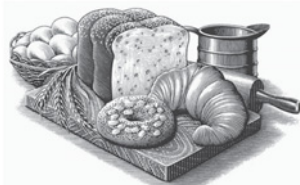

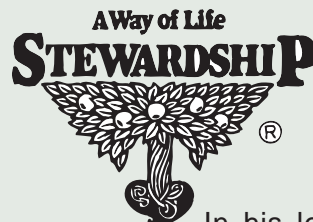

Boast in the Lord

What are you most proud of? What do you like to boast about? Were you top of your class in college? Are your children the most well-behaved? Do you work harder than anyone in your office? Or are you the best at appearing to work hard, but hardly working? Everyone likes to have something they are the best at, or at least very good. But it really is kind of silly to base your own worth on what you accomplish. What truly makes us important is that we are loved by God. This love begins at our birth, long before we have accomplished anything. Our second reading tells how God uses the foolish, weak, or poorest people to shame those who are wise, strong and wealthy. Why? Because God loves the poor, the weak, the disabled, the homeless just as much as he loves the important people. What's more, the poor probably love God more than the powerful, rich people do.

And it's not just the external qualities that are important. Some wealthy people have great love for the poor. Some of the best teachers only work with disabled children. My dentist is a very good doctor, but is happiest when he goes to help the poor in Latin America. Our gospel on the Beatitudes makes that clear if you listen carefully. Blessed are not just the poor, but the poor in spirit; not only the hungry, but those who hunger for righteousness. That's what St. Paul means when he says, "Whoever boasts, should boast in the Lord." (1Cor 1:31) In other words, it is not so much what you do, as what God does through you. How much you know is less important than how well you know the Lord. It's not so much where you live, as whether God is living in you. Those who claim to love the poor have nothing on those who are loved by God.

So how do we get to be "important" to God? Instead of asking God to make my projects a success, I can ask Him what He wants me to do. Instead of reading every magazine or blog to impress your co-workers with your worldly knowledge, take time to read the scriptures and to listen quietly to the Lord in prayer. Instead of complaining about the government or your parish, try volunteering your time. And for all the good that you do, remember to thank the Lord.

The Answer is Always “Jesus”

St. Gregory the Great, who became Pope in 590 (590-564), “reformed” the Liturgy. He regularized what we now refer to as the *Gregorian Sacramentary*. He simplified and organized and approved a decisive arrangement of the Roman Canon...the Eucharistic Prayer (prior to Vatican II there was only one) thus giving the Lectionary its definitive form. The beautiful Gregorian chant often used in Pre-Vatican II Liturgies bears this great Pope’s name.

It was around this time that what we know as the Nicene Creed (Council of Nicea, 325) made its way into the Mass. Originally the “creeds” were meant to be used at baptisms not the Mass They were personal professions of faith which stressed “**I believe,**” not the “**We believe,**” of the community at Mass.

Around 785 or so, the Holy Roman Emperor Charlemagne asked for a “*Roman*” Mass book because he wished to standardize the liturgy according to the *Roman* usage. With the help of an English monk, Alcuin, bits and pieces from the sacramentaries of Popes Leo, Gelasius (used in Gaul) and most of St. Gregory’s sacramentary were blended together to form the Roman Missal. The ensuing Roman Rite used Latin as its official liturgical language. The Rites were simple, ascetic, dull and plain with prayers that were short but dignified. On the other hand, the rites of Church in the East, in Constantinople, were exuberant, happy, florid and very, very long. Fortunately as the years passed the West borrowed rites and rituals from the East, namely our Holy Week rituals, and some decorative and symbolic processions and blessings. The mixing of the liturgies of East and the West took nothing from the dignity of the western rites but gave it enough variety and restrained emotion to make it quite beautiful.

During the early Middle Ages the Roman Missal became a sacred tradition that no one wanted to touch except for unimportant details. For example....what was referred to as the prayers at the foot of the altar ...**the Introductory Rite**, was found in the first printed edition of the Roman Missal in 1474. Actually these prayers started out as part of the private preparation of the priest during the very early medieval times. They were added to the Mass prayers in the Roman Missal but changed nothing of importance.

Our liturgical books are an authentic expression of our Catholic faith....in the Missal we have a magnificent synthesis of Christian doctrine – the Holy Eucharist, Sacrifice, prayer, Christian worship the Incarnation, and Redemption.....all of the dogmas of our shared Faith are expressed in the Roman Missal.

“I have risen: I am with you once more.” (Luke 24:34)

Our Blessed Lord has indeed risen, and awaits our visit in Eucharistic Adoration.

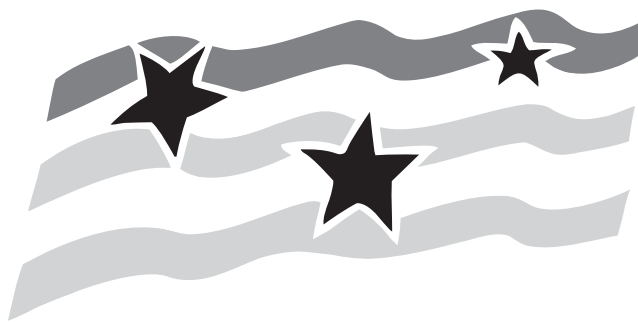

On Sunday, October 10th, longtime Potosi High School basketball Coach Cy Bradley was inducted into the Missouri Basketball Coaches Association Hall of Fame at the Missouri Sports Hall of Fame in Springfield.

Coach Bradley compiled a career record of 433 victories and only 179 defeats over 23 years of coaching at **St. Joseph's of Farmington**, North County, and Potosi. His winning percentage over twenty-three years was .707 and his teams averaged 19 wins a year over his coaching career.

Coach Bradley started his coaching at St. Joseph's High School in Farmington in 1962. During his tenure, St. Joe's compiled a record of

108-44 from 1962-1967, including three District titles, a Sectional title, and a Final Four appearance during the 1965-1966 season. Bradley then came to Potosi High School for the 1967-1968 season and won the MAAA Conference title. From there he spent three years at North County High School winning the MAAA in 1970-1971.

After seven very successful years as a Junior High Coach at Potosi, Coach Bradley returned to the varsity sidelines at PHS for the 1978-1979 season and spent the next 11 seasons at the helm for the Trojans. Bradley's teams won 6 more MAAA Conference championships and a District title in the 1982-1983 season. Bradley retired after the 1989 season, but came back in 1994, leading the Trojans to 22 victories. He retired after the 1996-1997 season having amassed a record of 277 victories and 103 defeats at PHS.
